9.45 – 10.45	<p>SESSION 1</p> <p>Responding to COVID-19 – the role of CCGs, lessons learnt and implications for the future</p> <p><i>The impact of COVID-19 has been unprecedented and will continue to affect how health and care is commissioned and delivered in the future for years to come. The impact on people’s mental health, accessing services, pressures on social care and a sharper focus on health inequalities will just be some of the considerations commissioners will need to respond to. For example, a recent Ipsos Mori survey, commissioned by the Health Foundation, found that half of people in Great Britain have concerns about the impact of the pandemic on their mental health.</i></p> <p><i>The NHS has already shown its capability to adapt to urgent and changing pressures, with CCGs playing a vital role in this effort. There is now an opportunity to build on this experience and share the learning and broader implications for future commissioning.</i></p> <p><i>This session will be an opportunity to hear experiences from leaders across the landscape, including what worked well, what didn’t and what should be taken forward in an evolving commissioning landscape.</i></p>

Achieving this ambition will be complex and require collaborative working across a number of organisations to be successful, including between primary care, community, voluntary and mental health services.</i></p> <p><i>To successfully deliver the seven national priorities alongside the more targeted needs of their local populations, emerging Primary Care Networks will need to be supported and underpinned by strong system leadership. This will be especially important during the uncertain times of COVID-19 and increasing health inequalities.</i></p> <p><i>This session is an opportunity to hear from leaders about their vision for the future of primary care, how successful networks and collaborations can be achieved and what good commissioning looks like.</i></p>

2.45-3.45pm	<p>SESSION 6</p> <p>System working – optimising the future role of Commissioning</p> <p><i>Whilst the global pandemic presented unprecedented challenges for health and social care organisations, it also accelerated progress in how they can collaborate and work together to respond to the needs of the population. CCGs played a pivotal role in coordinating the response to COVID-19 and strategic commissioning will continue to be a cornerstone of future models of care.</i></p> <p><i>Following the emergency response to COVID-19, there is renewed focus on establishing Integrated Care Systems (ICS) and a model of ‘system by default’, yet uncertainty remains as to what this looks like in practice. For example, the NHS Confederation’s recent survey of STP and ICS leads and chairs illustrates how COVID-19 has affected leaders’ attitudes towards whether emerging systems should be statutory integrated authorities, voluntary partnerships or a more middle ground between the two – with an increased preference for a statutory footing.</i></p> <p><i>This session will explore the next steps for ICS’s and a ‘system by default’ model, how we retain the role of strategic commissioning in the new world and what learning can be shared from Integrated Care Providers.</i></p>
